Comments from BKMCC

While is it good news that there is very little crime reported, we are concerned that some local crimes are not being notified.

The Chairperson reviewed the ERC Cabinet meeting notes in which Crime Statistics for the whole of East Renfrewshire are provided.

Summary:

Acquisitive Crime

Ten crimes were recorded relating to homes being broken into (including attempts) during Q1 (Quarterly Report: Apr to Jun 2022), 28.6% lower than in the same period last year.

This is still well below the 5-year average figure with a reduction of 47.4%.

Public Protection

Up to and including Q1, sexual crimes have increased with 28 victims coming forward. Detection rate for this year is 35.7%, which is lower than the 5-year average.

Drug Dealing & Use

In this quarter, we have recorded 37 drug related offences, 36.2% fewer than last year & 47% fewer than 5 year average - Applies to whole of East Renfrewshire

Violent Crime

Three serious assaults; this is less than same period last year and the 5-year average. However, minor assaults have increased by 12%.

	Antisocial Behaviour & Disorder
	Calls classified as "Public Nuisance" are down by 49%. "Noise" complaints down by 3% compared to 2021-22 figures.
	Margaret commented that on a local what's app group, set up during Covid, as a means of helping neighbours, some suspicious behaviour was recorded, such as the apparent taking of photos outside some houses, entrance by strangers to back gardens for no legitimate reason, and young men knocking on doors asking to clean gutters, deliver milk etc. This raised suspicion on the part of some householders.
	The Chairperson reported he had witnessed Police Activity in Broom Park on 2^{nd} November where three police cars and a dog van were in attendance. The Police dog swept the park.
	We received no information at all about this.
	The Chairperson offered to write formal letter to the Community police at Giffnock, enquiring about their reporting mechanisms.
	It is however, pleasing to note that the Police are increasing the number of patrols in our area.

SPORTS FIELD BROOM PARK	The new Mearns Castle High School sports facilities are developing well and scheduled for completion before Christmas 2022.	
	A resident commented about the bright floodlights shining into his house. He also raised concerns about people parking outside his house once the pitches are being used.	
	The Chairperson advised that the BKMCC discussed these issues last year when the planning application was submitted.	
	We were told the floodlights would be switched off at 7pm and the sports facility is only for use by the school and there should not be a large number of cars. Parents collecting children should use the school car park.	
BRIDGE AT	There has still been no progress.	
BROOM BURN	Cllr. Bamforth asked Jane Corrie for an update on the bridge at Broomburn, and received the following response:	
	"Further to your recent enquiry I can advise that our

	contractor has confirmed that their supplier has been in touch to let them know that there has been a delay with the manufacture of the new footbridge for the site at Broomburn and it will now be mid-January before it is available.	
	This is disappointing, but to start again with procurement would only cause further delay and other contractors will be experiencing the same difficulties with materials supply"	
	Planned installation for around 19th January 2023.	
TRAFFIC SIGNAGE ON MEARNSKIRK ROAD	Further to the BKMCC's communications with ERC Roads Dept., we received the following response:	
	"We can confirm that the failure of drivers to leave the Co- op car park access unobstructed has been brought to our attention and observations have affirmed these reports. Consequently, the Roads Service has instructed our contractor to lay "KEEP CLEAR" markings adjacent to the car park access to remind drivers of their duty in this regard.	
	We trust that this amendment will improve access to/from the store's car park."	
	A Keep Clear sign has been installed.	
	Cllr Anderson advised a Yellow box is not appropriate for this place.	
	Comments:	
	Drivers still stop on this sign.	
	The positioning of the chicane (Heading South) means drivers have to stop on an incline causing headlight blinding to traffic approaching from the south.	
	The Chicane has not been designed very well – both ends have right of way.	
	The Mearnskirk Owners Association said nobody was notified of this until it was installed. The MOA did not have a chance to review or comment.	
	Emails were sent to wrong or obsolete email addresses, in spite of the fact ERC had been notified of the change.	
	Cllr. Anderson is meeting with Head of Service for Roads, and offered to put our comments to them.	
	The Chairperson wrote a letter to the Police asking about accidents and speeding on this road. He received a response saying there have been no reported accidents or speeding.	



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TRAFFIC SPEED ON WATERFOOT ROAD	The Chairperson sent another copy of our letter and received a response on 28 th October 2022 from Ross McDowall	
	ERC have allocated £150k to improve road safety on Waterfoot Road, between Cruachan Drive and St Clare's Primary School. This will include widening the pavement and adding a cycle lane on the west side of Waterfoot Road between the above two locations.	
	Waterfoot Road from Broom Road East to the junction with B767 Glasgow Road	
	The Roads Department at ERC state "It is an established fact that vehicle speed is influenced more by the characteristics of the road than by the posted speed limit. Therefore, given the rural characteristics of this stretch of Waterfoot Road it is unlikely that the majority of drivers would comply with a reduced speed limit of 30mph.	
	Any reduction in speed limit must first gain the support of Police Scotland. For the reason given above it is extremely unlikely that Police Scotland would support a reduction of the posted speed limit to 30mph. Nor would a 30mph speed limit be appropriate."	
	According to the most recent road safety data available at this time, there has been 1 slight injury collision on this stretch of road in the last 5 years, compared to 368 across the rest of East Renfrewshire.	
	There are no plans to alter the speed limit along this stretch of road.
